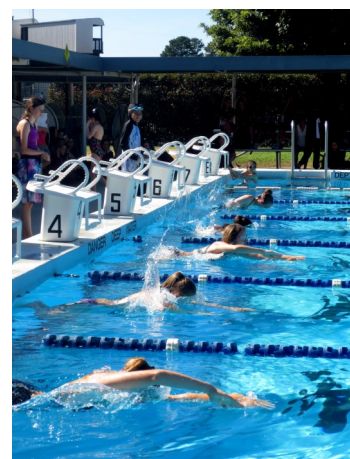




Swimming Carnival

The Science Department at Ogilvie High School is using a web based programme called Education Perfect as a means of providing our students with access to skill and content learning. The programme offers each year group a formal learning programme that staff are using in conjunction with their classroom based programmes.

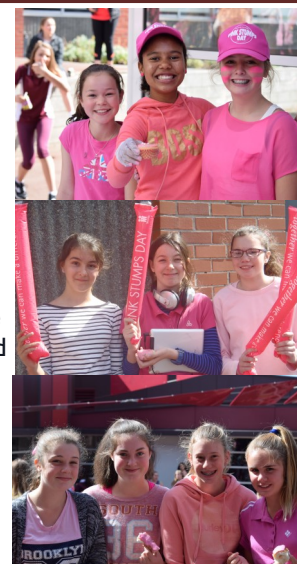

In the last week, all students have had their practical and theoretical skills analysed in science proficiency tests. These tests will allow for completely individual assessments to be made for each student and for a recommendations programme for the individual, to be designed. Thus, depending upon what skills need to be improved upon, each student will have the opportunity for improving with a programme that is specifically for them. This also allows for staff to access data pertinent to constant improvement in the design and implementation of our science programme. Parents are encouraged to remind students to bring their devices to school every day, as well as make sure learning devices are fully charged.

Congratulations to Ella Akers

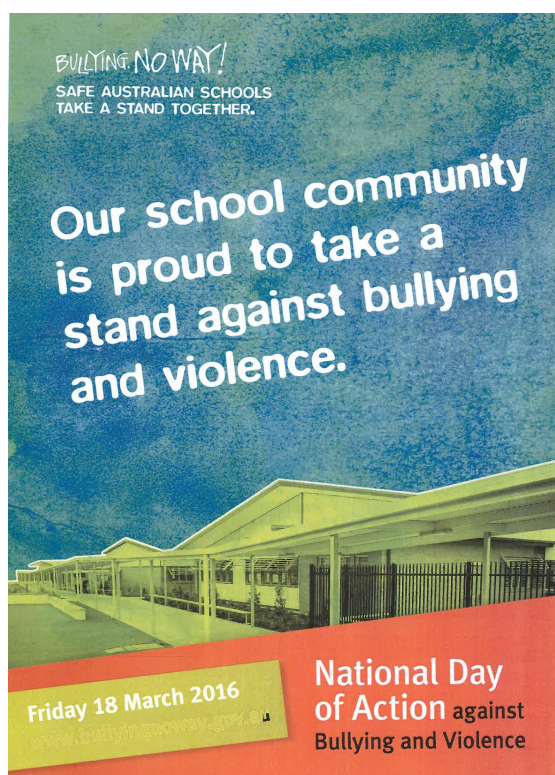
Big Picture student, Ella Akers, is taking part in the trip of a lifetime when she travels to the 62nd Cork International Choral Festival in April this year.
